

Pre-Trip Inspection

A good day of operation begins with a through pre-trip inspection of your equipment and cargo securement.

FLUID LEVELS: Your pre-trip should begin by pulling the hood and looking at engine components and fluid levels. Crankcase oil level, windshield wiper fluid level, belt condition and tension, signs of oil or exhaust leakage or anything else that looks unusual or out of place is cause for pause and possible attention. A dry or inoperative windshield wiper fluid reservoir is an easy violation on a roadside inspection.

LIGHTING: Check all lighting on your equipment; headlights, marker lamps, clearance lamps, brake and turn signals must all be functional daytime and nighttime. Inoperative lights/lamps is the number one equipment violation noted on roadside enforcement inspections.

TIRES: Begin your walk around with close examination of your tires. Look for uneven wear patterns, overall tread depth and air pressure. The number one reason for tire failure is low tire pressure, particularly during the hotter months. Look at your wheel lugs for any sign of looseness or oil leakage/weepage from the hub.

BRAKES: To the extent you can, look at your brake components. Any sign of a wheel seal leaking is a potential inoperative brake. Also listen for any audible air loss with the system charged. While it is difficult to measure pushrod movement by yourself and normally not an issue with automatic slack adjusters, you should still do a visual of the slack adjuster looking for anything unusual.

Take a look at your fifth wheel connection to make certain nothing has been tampered with while on your rest period and that the jaws are properly engaged around the pin.

TIE DOWN DEVICES: Tie down devices should be examined for damage such as cut or frayed straps or chains with bent or elongated links. Damaged tiedown devices should be replaced. Do an overall visual of your equipment and load. This is exactly what enforcement will do as you enter a POE or scale.

ATTENTION TO DETAIL: Does your equipment look clean (when weather conditions allow) and presentable or is it filthy and looking like it's in need of attention? The latter will nearly guarantee you get to spend some time stopped for an enforcement inspection.


